Trustees Hire Elementary Principal and Early Literacy Teacher

Steven Cook will be the next principal of Townsend Elementary School. He replaces Christina Hartmann, who leaves her eight-year tenure with the district on July 1 to move into the role of superintendent in Seeley Lake.

"We had a lot of great applicants," Superintendent Susie Hedalin told Townsend Schools trustees at the regular June 11 board meeting. "It was a very hard decision."

Cook, a Townsend native and Broadwater High School graduate, is a veteran administrator with more than 20 years experience. He is the current principal of Wendover Elementary School in Elko County, Nevada Since 2013, he has also been a part-time Townsend resident.

"He's been a successful administrator for years,"

Board Chairman Jason Noyes said.

Hedalin added that staff members said their preference was for "someone who could come in and hit the ground running."

Cook will take up the reins in Townsend this summer, once his contract for his current position ends.

Also, during the June 11 meeting, trustees approved the hire of Tiana Feller as the district's Early Literacy Teacher.

"We're excited to have her on a more full-time basis," middle school principal Brad Racht told the board.

Feller, a long-time and frequent substitute in the district, will lead the new pre-kindergarten program for four- and five-year-olds who meet the criteria to participate in the voluntary program to help them get on track to be reading by third grade.

Dora Dufran, Close Friend of Calamity Jane, Visits the Canton Church

On Friday, June 14, 2024, Dora DuFran (as portrayed by Mary Jane Bradford) – close friend of Calamity Jane – made an appearance at the Canton Church.

Calamity Jane is a legendary figure of the Old West – almost all legend very little fact. Calamity Jane's real name was Martha Canary. She was born in Missouri but her family followed the gold rush and moved to Virginia City. Martha Canary was certainly a colorful person, foul mouthed and a big drinker. She did live in a lot of Wyoming, Montana and South Dakota.

Mary Jane Bradford told the story of Calamity Jane through the voice of Dora DuFran a successful madam and business person in Deadwood, South Dakota. At the very beginning of the event Dora DuFran wondered if she should tell the story of Calamity Jane, bigger than life and a major figure in the literature of the time, or if she should tell the REAL story of Martha Canary.

Martha was a woman with many faults but also with a big heart. Throughout her life she aided and tended to those that had no-one else to count on: orphans, widows and many of the prostitutes who fell on tough times.

Calamity Jane was reported to live in many, many places throughout the West including Diamond City. Our very own Broadwater Bygones states that during the winter of 1896, Calamity Jane and her 12-year-old daughter lived in Townsend. Calamity Jane reportedly even visited the Townsend School relating her wild adventures.

Gay Ann Masolo told us that her grandfather said he once saw Calamity Jane playing poker in a bar in Toston!

Martha Canary had a big heart and a terrible thirst for alcohol. She would stop drinking and was a hard worker using much of her earnings to help others. Then, she would fall off the wagon and start drinking again – and she was a handful when drinking!

Martha died in Terry, South Dakota at the old age of 47. While she was not the legendary figure portrayed in dime novels, she certainly was memorable in her own right!

Mary Jane Bradford is a talented actor, historian and a talented historic interpreter. This is the second time Mary Jane has been at the Canton Church. Mary Jane comes to us through the Humanities Montana program. Last year she appeared as Nancy Cooper Russell relating her life as Charlie Russell's wife and manager.

We hope to have Mary Jane back again often!





More Public Land Added to Elkhorn Mountains





In partnership with Montana Fish and Wildlife Conservation Trust, a private inholding is now new public land.

TOWNSEND, June 17, 2024—Last month, the Helena-Lewis and Clark National Forest finalized a 40-acre land acquisition in partnership with the Montana Fish and Wildlife Conservation Trust. The former private inholding is now public land that will be managed by the Helena-Lewis and Clark National Forest. The property is located approximately 10 miles southwest of the City of Townsend in the Elkhorn Mountains.

"The acquisition of this private inholding in the Elkhorns will increase public land opportunities for

hikers, hunters and horseback riders," said Realty Specialist Tim Olson. "It will also enable more efficient management of these lands."

The Elkhorn Mountains stretch roughly 300,000 acres in central Montana and provide rich wildlife habitat. In 1986, the Elkhorns were designated a Wildlife Management Unit, one of the first in the nation and remain a great place to spot elk and other wildlife. No taxpayer funds were used to obtain the new land. The new parcel was paid for using the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) that collects royalties paid by energy companies drilling for oil and gas and reinvests them into protecting natural resources.

The Montana Department of Environmental Quality has reviewed

the above-named project. The project consists of installing a new one-million-gallon elevated composite water storage tank, approximately 8,400 feet of 16 to 18-inch transmission main (including a 600-foot bore under the Montana Ditch) and connection to the existing system. The project also includes replacing well buildings and well pumps for Well 1 and Well 2 and installing backup generators and replacing interior piping for Well 1, Well 2 and Well 3. In addition, this project will replace approximately 50 outdated fire hydrants and 40 old and damaged valves within the City's distribution system. The additional water storage is needed for domestic and improved fire flows throughout the city and the well improvements are needed to adjust for the new hydraulic demands created by the new tank and transmission main. The proposed tank will be constructed north of Highway 12 and east of Airport Drive and the Broadwater County Fairgrounds on a City-owned parcel of land. The transmission main will be installed along the north side of Highway 12 between the new tank and the connection point located at the intersection of Broadway Street and Harrison Avenue. The project will include all earthwork, piping, valves, level control equipment and appurtenances necessary to connect the new tank and well improvements to the existing water distribution system. The project will include all necessary surface repair.

Pursuant to ARM 17.40.318, the Department has concluded that the proposed project meets the Categorical Exclusion criteria of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and the Montana Environmental Policy Act (MEPA). 

state requirements but exceed these requirements. The requirements for graduation can be found on the Townsend School Website, in the Student Handbook. To graduate from BHS, a student must have a minimum of 18.5 specific credits, leaving room for 8.5 elective credits. While BHS offers electives in all subject areas to enrich a student's education, they also teach all required classes, including four full years of English. The current high school class offerings meet all requirements to attend any college or university chosen by a graduate of BHS. In recent years they have begun offering Dual Credit Classes (high school & college credit concurrently) as well as Early College Classes. Many of these college credit classes are free of charge to students, due to a ruling by the Montana Board of Regents, where students can receive up to six free credits from a Montana college while attending high school. These classes are offered to assist students with an early start to college, however, these college classes are not required to attend college. "Waivers" have not been necessary for BHS students

to attend college. BHS has produced students who have received degrees at over 12 Montana colleges, universities, and technical schools, as well as a variety of apprenticeship programs.

BHS not only has amazing coaches, BHS also has an amazing curriculum, standards, students, and staff.

Montana Energy is not Ready for Electric Vehicles

Last month, the Biden Administration published their finalized tailpipe emissions rule, an electric vehicle (EV) mandate which will upend the daily lives of Montanans. The EPA's new emissions rule calls for EVs to account for 56% of all cars by 2032, with two-thirds of all cars being electric or hybrid. However, with the state of Montana's electric vehicle usage and electric grid, this mandate spells disaster for our state's energy economy, electric grid, public safety, and way of life. As a business owner in Billings, I am very familiar with these economic challenges, and how they will affect Montana businesses as a whole. Most obviously, Montana is not an electric vehicle

state. Because only 0.18% of cars were electric as of 2021, our state is incredibly behind the two-thirds target that President Biden is mandating. With only 121 charging stations across our entire state, we would need drastic investments in costly charging infrastructure to support an economically viable EV transition. This would disrupt our state's transportation economy and cost millions to comply with federal regulations.

It's not any better for people with trucks. About 35% of vehicles in our state are pickup trucks. The Department of Energy estimates that a gas-powered truck with a full load would lose about 14% of its range. A Kelley Blue Book test found that an electric truck with a similar load lost about 25% of its range, traveling only 210 miles before losing its charge. Consumer Reports tested the hauling

capability of Ford and Rivian electric trucks and found

"significant reductions in driving range for both trucks

when pulling a heavy trailer" making them "impractical for long-hauls with a trailer".

The strain of EVs on our electric grid, which is already reaching its limit, is the most concerning issue with this transition. The EIA estimates that Montanans use 70% of their generated electricity, with the rest sent to other states. Straddling the eastern and western electric grids, our state provides fundamental electricity for the region. Yet with news from California of grid operators desperately requesting limits in EV charging during soaring heat waves, such a forced influx of EVs will no doubt push our critical electricity supply to the brink. Further strain will propel electricity prices up and grid reliability down, leading our state down a path to energy crisis.

This transition will also inject risk into Montana's power supply, which still relies heavily on coal-fired power plants. Ironically, the mandated use of EVs in the future will force an increase in electricity demand at the very same time that the Biden Administration is working daily to diminish our reliable and affordable energy supply.

Further, EVs have significant safety concerns that make them a poor fit for long-distance driving and backcountry use. As reported by CBS News, EVs with heavier batteries and vehicle weights had a greater impact in simulated crashes, posing a higher risk for highway safety. As a retired member of law enforcement, driver safety is of the utmost importance, particularly in a rural state with spread-out communities. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has also raised concerns about EV battery safety in flooding or extreme weather conditions, which makes them less suitable for Montana's summer wildfires and harsh winters, and a greater risk to public safety members responding to a crash.

These disastrous impacts can be avoided by stopping the implementation of the Biden Administration's drastic EV mandate. Repealing this rule is key to protecting Montana's energy industry and economy, along with consumers and families who simply do not want electric vehicles. To safeguard our state's reliable electric grid and ability to support other states' grids, we need leaders to stand up and tell the EPA this rule will hurt Montana, not help it.

Hunters Can Soon Register Online for the Game Damage Hunt Roster

Fish, Wildlife and Parks



HELENA – Hunters interested in participating in game damage hunt opportunities need to register online for the Hunt Roster beginning Saturday, June 15, through MyFWP. The roster is used by Fish, Wildlife & Parks to quickly respond to landowners who are

eligible for game damage assistance in the prevention or reduction of property or crop damage primarily caused by deer, elk and/or antelope. Hunters also can register to be placed on a bison game

damage roster. Occasionally, a bison is found outside of the authorized hunting season and outside of the bison tolerance zone. FWP is compiling a list of interested hunters to call for quick removal of the animal. These hunts could be during the warmer months of summer and will require quickly field dressing the animal with

a team of people armed with the appropriate tools. To register, hunters can log into their MyFWP account or click "look up draw results, register for

lists" within the menu. Then select a preferred hunting district(s) for potential deer, elk, antelope and bison damage hunts and submit. Hunters are asked to sign up for districts where they know the landscape and can respond quickly to game damage issues typically within 24 to 48 hours. The Hunt Roster sign-up closes Monday, July 15,

and a randomly generated list will be created from the online registrations and will be posted to MyFWP accounts by July 20. FWP will contact hunters if they are selected for a

damage hunt opportunity via phone and/or email, so hunters are asked to ensure they have accurate contact information in their licensing profile. FWP may also use other means of hunter selection in lieu of the Hunt Roster, including first-come, first-served advertised opportunities, unsuccessful special license or permit applicant lists or lists of names supplied by landowners depending upon each damage situation. 



I am creating an ad for a job for Visit Southwest Montana – our regional tourism organization. The job will be in Deer Lodge; I am planning to run the ad in the Deer Lodge paper, Anaconda paper and the Butte Montana Standard. I think the commute to the job from Butte is too far for someone living in Butte, but the Montana Standard is widely-read in the Deer Lodge area. But I was curious about exactly how long the commute would be from Butte.

I asked the Bing Co-Pilot AI program the distance from Butte to Deer Lodge. Co-Pilot responded that it was 37 miles taking I90. Out of curiosity I asked how far it was from Butte to Anaconda (it responded 24.3 miles) and how far from Anaconda to Deer Lodge (20.7 miles). If you do the arithmetic, you might notice there is about an 8 mile discrepancy between the quoted distances!

When I pointed out the 8 mile difference Co-Pilot thanked me for my attention to detail and then stated that the distance from Butte to Anaconda to Deer Lodge was 55 miles – scenic routes take longer! I pointed out that Co-Pilot seemed to have added another 10 miles to the route both from Butte to Deer Lodge and the Butte-Anaconda-Deer Lodge route. Again, Co-Pilot thanked me for my attention to detail and restated the 8 mile discrepancy between 37 and 45 miles.

I believe that the actual 8 mile discrepancy is about correct. There is a significant distance from the I90 Exit to the actual city of Anaconda. It seems to me that 4 miles each way is about right. That would account for the 8 mile distance.

So I asked Co-Pilot how far it is from the I90 exit to Anaconda. Co-Pilot stated about 8 (.6 miles to MT48 then 7.3 miles to Anaconda). Eight miles seemed a little long to me and would throw the Co-Pilot distance from Butte-Anaconda-Deer Lodge off by another 8 miles.

At that point, I switched to the Google Gemini Artificial Intelligence program and asked how far it was from the Anaconda MT exit on I90 to the city of Anaconda MT. Gemini responded that it was about 791 miles. Montana is a big state but having been to Anaconda recently I was pretty sure it was not 791 miles from the exit to the city!

Fortunately, Gemini provided me with a map and it was from somewhere in Washington State to Anaconda. I pointed out to Gemini that I was not in Washington. I said I was at I90 exit 208 in Montana and that I wanted the distance from there to the city. Gemini then responded it a little over 1100 miles! Again, I was pretty sure that wasn't right. This time the supplied map showed me

I stated again I was at the I90 exit for Anaconda and wanted the distance from there to the City. Gemini then offered to list the interesting attractions available to me from that exit.

I then stated that I wasn't interested in the interesting attractions just the distance from the exit to Anaconda. Gemini then responded that it was about 147 miles – this time it at least had me in Townsend, MT.

That was as close as Gemini was able to get to telling me the distance from the I90 exit to the City.

I think the AI industry still has a ways to go before I would classify anything as Intelligence!



It was the last of the railroad depots built in Butte. Of course, it closed long ago and stood empty for many years. Bill Fisher and family has renovated the station and made it a great event center with a grand hall and 2 (yes 2) bars.

The Casagranda's restaurant is right across the street from the Butte Depot. So, it was a short walk to the restaurant. We had reservations for 6:00 pm and we were promptly seated when we arrived.

Our end of the table got a bottle of Klinker Brick Cabernet (we were familiar with the wine from the May wine tasting event at the Betsy). It was excellent.

Between the eight of us dining, we ordered several number: (406) 782-2016.

steaks, chicken, paella, halibut and salmon. Everyone was happy with their dinner except for the salmon. It was an apple salmon and was far too sweet for the person that ordered the salmon; but the bowtie pasta that came with the meal was excellent. The meal I ordered was 18 ounces of perfectly cooked medium rare ribeye and came with double-baked baked potato.

appetite! The entrees include house-baked bread, salad, soup of the day and a scoop of Wilcoxson's ice cream for dessert.

Our server was a delightful young Butte native who was attentive, efficient and very sociable. We had a good time just talking with her.

After a great dinner we went to the historic Helsinki Bar in what was once the heart of Finn Town in Butte. The building was built as a boarding house and saloon in the 1890s. In 1908, the Hihnala family operated a rooming house and offered steam baths, or saunas, in the establishment to the residents of the Finn Town neighborhood. It was also known as the Helsinki Bar and Steam Bath. It has recently been renovated. The new owners were there and greeted us warmly. Pork Pesto Sausage:

Two Recipes, Lots of Options

I was in the middle of testing a new sausage recipe and, given the scarcity of wild turkey and pig meat in our freezer, I started with commercial meat. (That's the routine. I don't use wild meat until the recipe is pretty close to perfect.) Well,

this time the first try was spectacular, so I decided to share that with our non-hunting friends and neighbors while adding further details for the wild turkey and pig versions.

The sausage part of this recipe makes 20 meatballs. I only used half for this dish, the other half spiced up a pasta dinner the next night. It's pretty easy with your favorite bottled marinara sauce, adding the meatballs to heat them together in the microwave. Each meal served two generously, which just fit our family. For bigger families, double the veggie portion of the recipe here and use all 20 meatballs.

Have mild-tasting wild turkey thighs, breasts or wild pig in the freezer, just grind it up and mix ½ pound of each--wild white meat and ground store-bought pork roast.

Pork Pesto Sausage and Veggies Serves 2-3

For the meatballs:

1 pound ground pork roast (store-bought, not wild)

3/4 cup pesto*

1 large egg

½ cup grated Parmesan cheese

*I used RAO'S® bottled 'homemade' pesto (from Walmart) which is different from my homemade pesto in two ways: first, my pesto has no salt; second mine has ¼ the oil, or less, than RAO'S. Why? So you could easily reproduce this recipe without worrying how different your pesto is from my homemade. Besides, the 6.7 ounce jar holds ¾ cup, so the size was perfect.

Sausage Preparation:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400°F. Combine the pesto, egg, grated Parmesan and ground pork in a large bowl. Mix it by hand, or pulse 8-10 times in a food processor until well mixed.
- 2. Shape the pork mixture into 20 medium-sized meatballs, about 1³/₄ inch in diameter, place on a foil-lined baking sheet and bake for 10 minutes. Set them aside while you sauté the veggies.

For the veggies:

2 tablespoon oil

1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes

1/4 teaspoon black pepper

2 cups coarsely chopped onion


1 ½ cups sliced red and orange sweet peppers 1 ripe tomato, coarsely chopped

Grated Parmesan at the table

Cooking:

- 1. Start a large saucepan on medium heat, adding the oil and red pepper flakes and black pepper to the pan. Test the pan with a chunk of onion: if it sizzles, it's ready. Add the rest of the veggies to the pan, including the tomato.
- 2. Stir the veggies often, on medium heat, for about 5 minutes, then add half the meatballs to the mixture, lower the pan to medium-low, but still sizzling. Stir the veggies gently into the meatballs, and cook another 5 minutes. The meatballs should be hot and the veggies soft but not browned. Browning the meatballs a bit is optional, but not necessary.
- 3. Serve with more grated Parmesan. Toast some garlic bread too, if you're missing the carbs. My Dad always paired Italian food with a cold Miller's High Life, Mom a bit of red wine. I'm ambidextrous, but it's your choice.

There are 75 flavor choices in Eileen's Sausage Season. Whether you use wild or farm-raised meat to make sausage it should fit your personal taste--whether those tastes range to more or less red pepper and salt, or a Tex-Mex with no cilantro or believe cracked fennel is de rigueur for Italian—100% control is a good thing.
