# Family Medical Clinic Building Demolished

The Family Medical Clinic Building on Broadway and Cedar Streets lived out its lifetime. The modular building saw its last day Wednesday, February 26 when Gruber Excavating of East Helena tore it down.

Dr. Nicholas Campbell, owner of Family Medical Clinic, now has his offices at 220 Broadway Street when he vacated the Cedar Street building three years ago. He said the demolished building was occupied by a dentist when he came to Townsend in 1984, so Campbell was one of the last doctors to work in a basement office in the "old" hospital before the existing hospital, Billings Clinic Broadwater, was built in 1986. Campbell moved his practice to the Clinic building that year and worked for the hospital also.

According to Commissioner Debi Randolph when Family Medical Clinic owner Dr. Nicholas Campbell moved out, the Commissioners laboriously went through the steps to have the building demolished. They first ordered an appraisal, then offered the building through auction. Eventually Great West Engineering, at the commissioners' request, did a use review only to report the building was not worth saving, because of "safety issues." It was also an "eyesore." Two contractors answered the request for bid. "Gruber Excavating company bid the least to remove the building. Now, 3 years later it is finally happening. Getting the building torn down is a case study in what government has to go through to get something done," she said.

Randolph did not venture future plans for the empty lot, but said the commissioners might consider adding modular office space, should the money ever become available. Currently, there is no money available in the general fund for such an expenditure. However, crowded office space in the courthouse would warrant such an idea, she said.

# Good Neighbor Award Surprises Recipient at Ag Day Dinner

Phil Knaub looked surprised when Conservation District President Dallas Diehl called him to the podium at the annual Ag Day Dinner Saturday night. After listening to a litany of outstanding service to his Forest Service job and his community, Knaub walked away with the 2025 Good Neighbor Award.

A 28-year veteran of the Forest Service, Knaub has assisted with many fires in the county, in Montana and across the United States. He helped coordinate cleanup work after Hurricane Helene and as an Incident Command team member at the Ashville, North Carolina hurricane and flood. He has restored thousands of acres of grass and shrublands in the Elkhorns working with the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation and other partners and helped build a SharePoint website for Forest districts to use during emergencies. He also was on the recovery team for the Columbia Space Shuttle Disaster. "During his 18 and a half years with Townsend Rotary Phil has transformed his knowledge into practical, meaningful solutions, made evident through his work but probably best known around here as logistical coordinator for Fall Fest, and for "Phil's Forest" on Broadway for the Christmas Stroll," Diehl said.

Diehl presented Knaub with a Good Neighbor plaque and said "Phil, thank you for your outstanding contributions to preserving and protecting our national forests and your steadfast service to the people of Broadwater County, of Montana and the USA."





#### Legislative Update

eral important bills that Broadwater

County residents need to be aware of - particularly those concerning property taxes and water management.

Three major property tax bills are currently under consideration. HB 231 provides modest property tax relief while slightly increasing taxes on homes located on agricultural land, as well as on the agricultural land itself. HB 155 offers a higher level of property tax relief for lower value homes but also raises property taxes on agricultural land and business property to a greater extent than HB 231. Another bill, SB 90, which originated in the Senate, redirects tourism dollars towards property tax relief for communities. With that said, it also reduces the funding available to the state for tourism promotion and programs aimed at attracting more visitors to Montana. The reality is – there is no perfect bill.

Another legislative item impacting Broadwater County is SB 358, the exempt well bill. This bill is the result of months of work by a water stakeholder group which included a diverse set of partners, such as producers, developers, county and city governments, and conservation groups. SB 358 establishes geographic regions across the state based on scientifically and legally available water, along with different rules for DNRC regarding monitoring those areas and exempt wells.

Green areas allow up to 24 exempt wells per development (under 160 acres), with water usage capped at 0.5 acre-feet per acre and a maximum of 1 acre-foot per lot. Legislative **Update**, 6



others by speeding. He is sentenced to a \$500 fine, with credit time served for two days (at \$82.50/day). He must not possess drugs or alcohol, must attend Prime for Life, must complete a chemical dependency evaluation within 30 days, pay fees and surcharges, and pay \$250 to the Office of Public Defenders Michael Broadbrooks had a Change of Plea; plead-

ing Guilty to partner/family member assault. In his elocution, he stated that during an argument he caused reasonable apprehension of injury to the victim; and to a charge of criminal mischief, he caused damage to property of \$694.53. He must pay a fine of \$100, attend batterers education, pay \$10% administration fee, have no contact with the victim. He receives a two-year deferred Sentence, with one day credit time served.

Christopher Killmeyer had an Initial Appearance and Arraignment; pleading Not Guilty to a charge of DUI (5th). Omnibus is due by April 18; Pre-Trial is set for October 17, with the Jury Trial scheduled November 17.

Jack White had his Bond Modification continued until March 28.

#### Legislative Update, 3

Beyond that, there are no restrictions on exempt wells. Yellow areas follow the same rules as green areas, but require additional monitoring by the DNRC, with areas in Flathead and Yellowstone County currently being the only designated yellow area. Red areas generally do not allow exempt wells, with limited exceptions. Residents and developers in these areas must connect to a community water system, obtain a permit, use an existing water right, or have water delivered. Some of Missoula, Gallatin, the Bitterroot, and Helena fall into this category. (A map is available online for reference.) Newly constructed units in every category will be required to have meters to monitor water usage and DNRC will evaluate the data annually. Ultimately, this bill is a compromise between all parties involved.

Regardless of the green area designation of Broadwater County in the bill, DNRC reports that the county is legally over appropriated with respect to available water and, as many already know, is in a closed basin. Since the water and water-right holder's rights in Broadwater are at-risk, I will be taking action to have at least some of Broadwater County designated as a yellow area in the bill. A yellow designation simply means increased monitoring and support from the DNRC. In my opinion, providing more scientific oversight of our water

Clerk & Recorder and Election Administrator Angie Paulsen stated, "Thank you, Broadwater County, for your unwavering diligence in caring about the elections process, updating your voter registrations, and staying in contact with my office to make sure the democratic process is actualized through a high rate of voter participation. My goal is to be transparent in conducting elections while maintaining efficiency and accuracy. I am proud to say Broadwater County was one of the first counties in the state to upload 2024 Presidential Election results due to my amazing staff, election judges and an overall resounding positivity from Broadwater County voters."

In addition to Clerk & Recorder, Election Administrator and County Surveyor duties, Paulsen serves on the Montana Clerk and Recorder Association's ("MACR") Executive Board, comprised of all 56 counties, and serves on the MACR Board of Directors, MACR Legislative Committee and is MACR's Public Relations and Elections Outreach Chair.

#### MONTANA ELECTION LEGISLATION

Paulsen closely tracks legislation that could affect her office, particularly the hundreds of election bills proposed this session. On Saturday, March 1, 2025, Paulsen testified during a Senate Committee meeting regarding Senate Bill 490 (SB490), which would shift the late voter registration time during federal elections from 8 am-noon Monday, the day before the election, to 8 am-5 pm on Saturday. This legislation would still leave voters the option to register on election day from 8 a.m. to noon.

By shifting the voter registration times, the goal is to eliminate long wait times on election day and additionally help with the chaos that ensues the Monday before elections for Election Administrators, election judges and voters, as Monday's deadlines cannot be done before Monday. The Monday before election day is the day Paulsen's office prints lengthy voter registers for each polling place, preps election machines, disburses supplies to polling locations, coordinates with over 50 county elected officials, department heads, and election judges. In her Senate Committee testimony, she noted only

getting 3-4 hours of sleep the night before a federal election, due to the workload on Monday, and then she works a 24-hour shift election day. Thus, Paulsen believes SB490 will help mitigate election day lines, aid in proficiency for her staff and election judges, diminish provisional ballot issues, and hopefully gain more hours of sleep before the biggest election day of Another key piece of legislation that would affect

voters is House Bill 719 (HB719), which will add the voter's date of birth to an absentee elector's signature affirmation envelope; an added measure to enhance voter verification procedures for absentee ballots. availability is beneficial for our county.



# Immigration: Who is the Immigrant?

The southern border. Masses of people streaming to the walls, clamoring to get into the U.S. These poor and dirty people all striving to enter

the U.S. and start a new life. The media presents this image as the "immigration situation" of the United States painting the picture of our immigration woes as predominantly low-income Latinos. Rarely do we see the full picture of the problems facing immigration and our immigration situation.

Where are these people coming from and why do they want to be here? The most common answers are Mexico and to become citizens. Let's evaluate these answers for a moment. Imagine you are from Mexico. Your family has lived here for generations and all you know is Mexican culture and the Spanish language. Due to political unrest, lack of resources, and social unrest living in Mexico is no longer a safe and tenable option. The one option: migrate to the U.S. with the hope of providing enough money for your family. Notice the details of this very common situation. These people who are immigrating want to help their families and return to them, the situation in their homeland is unsafe, and they have one hope which requires leaving everything behind. Between 80-85% of migrant Hispanics seeking immigration come for economic reasons. The part we don't understand is that half of migrants send money earned in the U.S. back to their families in their country of origin. Nearly half of immigrants are fleeing Latin American countries due to violence in their homes. The image I presented above represents only part

of the immigration situation of the U.S. This image usually dominates our perspectives on immigration and ignores the real issues. Each year the U.S. government sets an immigration quota for each country of the

world implying that immigrants come from all over the world. Those who get to enter the country legally have a few common characteristics: they have money and they have status. The legal process of becoming a U.S. citizen is very expensive usually costing thousands of dollars in legal and processing fees. Any misstep in the process could bar the person from legal status for 10 years or cost thousands more in fees. Those who get to start the process of legal status have some type of status. They tend to have a prospect for a good job in the U.S., speak the language, and have connections or intelligence to navigate the system. Even with these advantages the system strives to make the process exceptionally difficult.

Obtaining legal status in the United States is immensely complex with many challenges requiring thousands of dollars and over 10 years of work. Before we begin to judge those who come over illegally and those who come legally, we should understand our legal process and make sure it fits our values and provides a decent legal way for people to enter. Let me put it this way, if the legal process was efficient and understandable, wouldn't most people choose it? Who wants to be worried about deportation, losing their children, or losing their opportunities? Most people would choose

the legal option if it were understandable and reasonable. On Monday, March 17th, we will explore the issues of immigration from both the practical and legal perspectives. Michelle Williams, who practices immigration law in Boise, Idaho, will present on the issues with immigration law and I will present on stories and issues facing our immigration system. The goal of this event is to both encounter immigrants as people and understand the challenges facing immigration in the U.S. The event is at Holy Cross Church, 101. S Walnut St and begins at 6 pm with dinner followed by an activity, presentations, and discussions. This event is open to everyone. Come one, come all.







#### Lois J. Kimpton

#### Family of Lois J. Kimpton

Lois J. Kimpton, age 94 of Toston March 10, 1930 – February 27, 2025

On the morning of February 27, 2025, Lois Kimpton peacefully left this world at the age of 94, eleven days from her 95th birthday, stepping into the embrace of the Lord and reuniting with the many loved ones who passed before her.

She was born on March 10, 1930, to Cecil and Zona Johnson in Winston, Montana, one of five spirited sisters.

Lois had a love for life that shone through in everything she did. Growing up in the depression, the family moved around wherever her dad could find work. At one point they lived in Great Falls near the river where her and her sisters would go swimming. They also lived up near the Vossburg mine outside of Winston in the mountains.

Ultimately, they settled in Townsend where Lois went to Broadwater County High School. In her youth, she was an avid athlete, playing basketball in high school. In those days the team made their own uniforms that looked like jump suits. They lived near a roller skating rink and all the girls were taught to roller skate.

Lois loved dancing, mostly the jitter bug and often said that she danced her way through high school. It was in those early years that she met the love of her life, Albert Kimpton, whom she married on May 4, 1948. Together, they built a life filled with love, hard work, and family. They raised four children—Dave (Mary) of Phoenix, Steve (Kathy, deceased) of Toston, Cliff of Toston, and Zona (Kathleen) of Toston.

In 1959, Lois and Albert settled into the home where they would spend their years together, raising cattle, horses, and farming. In the early years, she shared in the responsibility to cook for the haying crews with her mother-in-law Mildred Kimpton and her sister-in-law Gerry. She really didn't know how to cook after they were first married and the stories about her attempts were comical.

The haying crews were men who Albert and his brother, Bill, would pick up from what was called the 'jungles' which was a place in Helena where men would come during haying season off the trains to work. Lois even went with them sometimes.

As the family grew so did the traditions. Lois would make Christmas, Easter and Thanksgiving dinners bringing everyone together. Branding in April and shipping the calves in the fall were always fun events for both friends and family where she would put on big spreads and then everyone would play poker. She would stay up at Cow Camp and provide meals for the spring work of putting the cows out for the season and she would also haul meals to the riding crews if the brandings were done in the mountains.

After high school, Lois took a correspondence course from the University of Nebraska for general studies. As her children grew, Lois pursued a career, first working at the Soil Conservation Service. She later earned her real estate license, eventually becoming a broker and the proud owner of Broadwater Realty.

Her love of discovery extended beyond business—she was an avid reader, a collector of stamps and coins, and she found joy in hunting for purple glass in forgotten places. She was also a dedicated bowler, playing in a league for many years, and she cherished every moment spent with her grandchildren. She and Albert traveled quite a bit with family and friends during their life together, which took them all over the west visiting family, going to roping and rodeo events, and just exploring the countryside.

For nearly two decades, Lois faced Alzheimer's with remarkable grace and resilience. She never lost her gentle spirit, her gratitude, or her ability to bring warmth to those around her. Even in her final days, she would ask about Albert, never quite remembering that he had been waiting for her in heaven for 19 years. Now, at last, they are together again.

Lois is preceded in death by her beloved husband, Albert; her parents, Cecil and Zona; her sisters, Anice

Call To Action

Montana State Attorney General Austin Knudsen is one of 17 Attorneys General who are suing to have Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act declared unconstitutional. Section 504 protects people with disabilities from discrimination at school and in the workplace.

Section 504 requires schools and workplaces to provide reasonable accommodations for students and employees with disabilities, and protects them from forms of discrimination such as being passed over for a promotion or denied a raise due to their disability. Nearly a third of Montanans rely on these protections. Furthermore, accidents happen, and anyone could find themselves in need of Section 504 protections at any time.

It is irresponsible for Attorney General Knudsen to be attempting to do away with a law that provides protections that so many Montanans rely on. I urge everyone to write or call to him asking to drop this lawsuit.

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
